

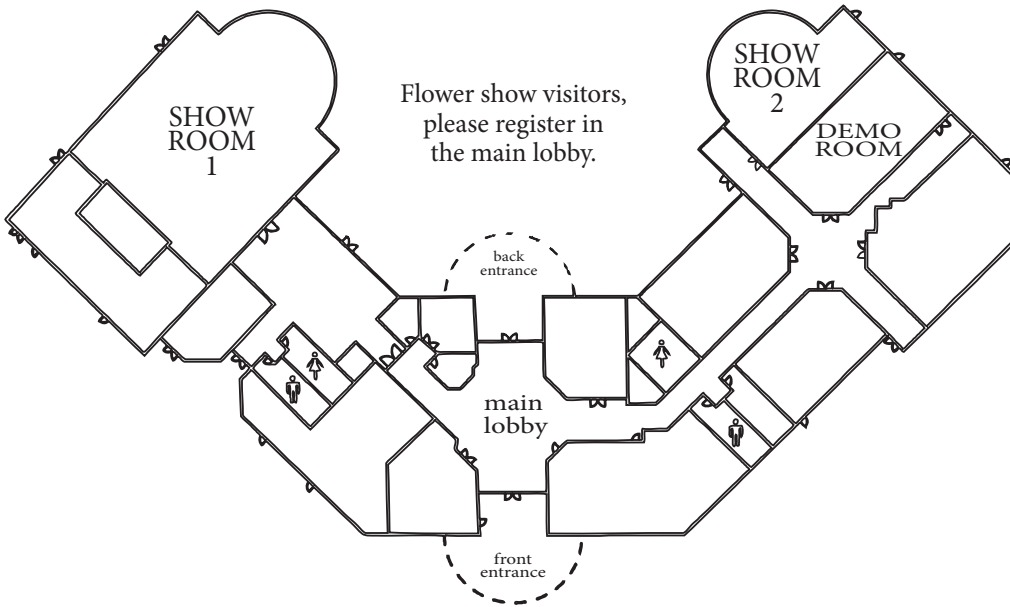

This philosophy nurtures each artisan's aesthetic sense and we are delighted to share their art!

Social Room: Show Room 2

This show room highlights the beauty of Chrysanthemums. The Chrysanthemum was adopted by the Emperor of Japan as his official seal, and in 1910 it became Japan's national flower. The "Festival of Happiness" in Japan celebrates this flower. The Wafu School logo is also a silhouette of the football mum (kiku).

Ranging in shapes, sizes and colors, they are especially beautiful when combined with autumn material such as graceful grasses and berries. It is also popular because the Chrysanthemum flower symbolizes fidelity, optimism, joy and long life. In honor of "Autumn Spectacular," enjoy these lovely arrangements!
